



Social fabric weakens amid deepening divisions

- Business is the only institution seen as competent and ethical.
- Fifty-three percent of respondents globally say that their countries are more divided today than in the past.
- CEOs are obligated to improve economic optimism and hold divisive forces accountable.
- Trust in government at all-time low.




Public Engagement in California

OPPORTUNITY FOR CHANGE

Public meetings often do not meet the needs of residents or local officials.

Public comment agendas are dominated by narrow interests and negative remarks



Large segments of the public are missing, especially low-income populations, immigrants and young people

Many desire broad-based public participation and stronger collaboration.

TAKING ACTION FOR STRONGER PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Funders can make a difference by supporting:







Ways to Boost your Credibility

- Understand that these are people, not avatars.
- Know who has jurisdiction so you start at the right place.
- Consistently show up at events, meetings, fundraisers.
- Invite electeds or staff to business/neighborhood meetings.







Ways to Boost your Credibility

Use same dynamics as you do for interpersonal relationships:

- Balance positives and negatives
 - Thank them when you think they've done a good job
 - Voice criticisms
- Self-regulate/use emotional intelligence



Distractions in dialogue can cause a Sudden Loss of Credibility

- Arrogance: "In my expert opinion"
- **Condescendence**: "When you get a little older, you'll have a much better understanding"/ "If you were accountable to the bottom line, you'd understand..."
- Political: "We all know that everyone thinks..."
- Insulting: "You have no idea..." "It's obvious you don't care about..."
- Power play: "You deserve to be recalled.."






Special Districts

 - Schools










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Why Does it Matter?

- Understanding the roles of local government is key because: It can get complicated when you want your input to matter
 - "Defund the police" Taking police funding (city) to fund mental health (county)
 - Telling City Council you have a complaint about the way something was handled in a public school
 - A development in an unincorporated section of the county near a new housing development in the city



Understand the Basics

- Various funding, agencies, laws can limit options
 - Buckets of funding redevelopment, unrestricted, grants, utilities
 - Land use parameters
 - Laws and regulations
 - General Plan
 - Development agreements
 - Zoning
 - "Historic" buildings
 - Crosswalks and speed bumps
 - Pensions
 - The Brown Act



Public Engagement and Civic Leadership





Ways to Gain Understanding

- Citizen academies
- Leadership [Your town's name] sponsored by local chamber
- Community forum/town hall
- Public workshops to solicit feedback (public notice required by law, usually on website) gun safety





Ways to Gain Understanding

- Serving on board or commission (contact City Clerk)
- Participate in neighborhood associations (different from HOAs)
- Read the law (municipal code)
- Read contracts
- Ask staff

Drop in the chat ones you have participated in







- Writing uninformed or misinformed opinions or rants on social media or websites
- Unconstructive tirades against staff or elected officials (constructive ones are different)
- Bringing in superfluous or unrelated topics—airing all of your grievances at once and having them all addressed is not possible

Different Types of Dialogue

Official **Unofficial Constructive** Counterproductive





Dialogue is Different Based on the Individual's **Role in Local Gov**

Elected Official

- Listens
- Has latitude to express individual opinion
- *Caution when it involves Brown Act, indicating a vote on social media before vote is called, for example

Staff

- Listens
- Provides range of options based on legalities and practicalities.
- Has subject-matter expertise but not a vote





Official Public Dialogue

Our definition:

- Part of the official public record available at the Clerk's office, such as:
 - Comments spoken at an official government meeting (City Council, County **Board of Supervisors**)
 - Comments provided in conjunction with official process (EIR)

Level of candidness in response:

- Low
- Non-existent if it's not on the agenda



Unofficial Public Dialogue

Our definition:

- Happens in less formal settings, such as
 - Chamber meetings
 - Neighborhood meetings
 - Community coffees
 - Neighborhood events like ribbon cuttings

Level of candidness in response:

- Varies depending on previous experience with each other
- Could be higher if trust is there



Hybrid Dialogue

1. E-mail, text message

2. Social media posts and comments

3. Community forums

- Solution-oriented




